FAREWELL GRACE HUGGETT

Huggett Lane cuts a gentle curve into the hill above the Blackwood Mineral Springs before hiding itself away in the forest. At its very end sits a cottage built by Grace's husband, George, & his parents in the 1930's. Grace was a regular visitor to Blackwood from the mid-30's before marrying George in 1941 & calling the cottage home since the 60's.

Diane, her daughter, recounts,

"They were involved with Senior Citizens & Grace more so when on her own (George died in 1983). Grace was also involved in many fundraisers for Uniting Church, Senior Citizens, tennis & Easter events in Blackwood.

She played tennis when aged 65 to 80 but didn't run after the hard

Grace had 4 children, 15 grandchildren & 15 great grandchildren with another one on the way."

In extracts from her eulogy:

"She remembered many people's birthdays & other important occasions & sent cards & gifts with a cheerful spirit. Grace had an amazing memory, & was a real stickler for recalling specific details of happenings & events

Over the years Grace endured the sad loss of many members of her family, both older & younger, some under very tragic circumstances. She made herself available in various ways to show comfort & assistance where possible during these sad times & indeed also to many in the Blackwood Community as they lost their partners or family members, or were ill or lonely. She visited with some of the locals regularly & enjoyed attending weekly meetings at Blackwood Senior Citizens Club where she served on the committee. She held various offices over the years including Treasurer, Secretary, President, Vice President & happily got up early even in the winter on a Wednesday to travel on her 4 wheeled electric Gopher chair, along the road & up the hill track to the Club to open the doors by 9a.m. She enjoyed & supported bus trips for shopping & occasionally went on holidays for a few days which the bus company organised."

Grace left Blackwood in 2006 for a retirement home & later a lovely round robin of living with each of her 3 daughters for a few months at a time. Grace was hale & hearty to the end; Blackwood Times (Feb/Mar 17, p4) recalls bumping into her as she strode down Golden Point Rd. at the age

Also from the eulogy:

"In recent days she needed extra care & was admitted to hospital where she received oxygen & blood to assist with her breathing. Mum was very tired & she asked God to let her die peacefully in bed & to please take her home. She seemed to pick up a bit & looked like she would be out of hospital in a day or two. Then at 1.00am on Friday 23rd June 2017, after just settling back into bed, she had just dozed off when she took two deep breaths & passed on.."

Grace died just short of her 98th birthday.

Blackwood Action Group (BAG)

Being an old gold mining settlement, Blackwood has numerous blocks of uncategorised Crown land scattered throughout & around the town. Many of the smaller Crown land blocks were originally reserved for community purposes when the population of the town in the late 1800's had 13,000 people residing.

BAG plans to make a written submission to VEAC & would love to hear any ideas from residents on how they see these blocks of Crown land being best managed into the future. It will be important the future management does not compromise fire protection for the township. There is also the option of attending the community drop-in session at the Daylesford Neighbourhood Centre, 13 Camp Road, Daylesford, on Tuesday August 1, 2017 from 3pm to 7pm.

Written submissions can be submitted to VEAC up until August 21, 2017. Further info is available from their website http://veac.vic.gov. au/investigations/type/current & you can subscribe individually via their website for further updates on the investigation process.

THERE IS already plenty of confusion surrounding the practical application of the current fenceline clearing "4 metre rule" & how it is shared across the fenceline boundary, particularly with Crown land. For example, even given the 4 metre rule, if 4 metres is cleared on the freehold land side of the boundary, native vegetation clearing will not be granted on the Crown land side of the boundary fence.

BAG is concerned at the double standards being proposed between freehold land & Crown land, given the vegetation clearing between adjoining freehold landowners is normally shared equitably. The Crown will generally not share the costs of boundary fence construction & installation with the adjoining freehold land owner, even fencing maintenance is all at the freehold landowner's expense. If the boundary fence happens to burn down during a bushfire, the cost of replacing the fence is totally the responsibility & expense of the freehold land owner. Given these one sided standards, you would think the Crown would at least provide the courtesy of allowing sufficient fenceline clearing space to help their law-abiding neighbour protect their fence from any potential bushfire.

BAG plans to lobby the government on better bushfire protection for the town & will even submit a proposal for the costs of boundary fencing with the Crown within the township being shared equitably.

Blackwood CFA

So far a nice, quiet, albeit, chilly winter but never let complacency overshadow fire awareness. Just because it is cold & reasonably wet, emergencies, other than fires can strike at anytime so look around the house & be aware of leaving heating items on.

Check that the electric blanket is turned off when not in use. Electric heaters/fans are turned off when not needed & all their vents are free of any obstructions such as lint, dust, hair, material.

Ensure fireplaces are maintained & that the areas around them are kept safe & clear of anything that may ignite if an ember happens to fall from the fire place. Always keep a full spray bottle within reach of the heater as this can be used to squirt a few quick sprays into the fireplace to aid in knocking down a possible fire.

If you are drying clothes in front of the fire be wary of how close they are & always maintain a close eye on them.

Always be careful with children & candles & matches, the 3 should never mix.

When driving around in wintry wet weather avoid using the cruise control & travelling too fast or too close to other vehicles. Always keep an eye out for animals especially at night when they are particularly active.

UPDATE ON THE BLACKWOOD LOCALISED SEPTIC PROGRAM

The Blackwood Localised Septic Program (BLSP) has reached the halfway mark with some great milestones achieved over the past 12 months.

Round 2 septic tank upgrade works are almost complete with only a couple more jobs to complete by the end of July. Round 1 & 2 of the upgrade works has seen 27 residential properties throughout Blackwood & Barry's Reef receiving works as well as a 20,000L holding tank at the Blackwood Recreational Reserve.



The new system at the Recreation Reserve is now in operation & will provide sufficient capacity to accommodate the various community events & festivals held throughout the year without the burden of pumping the old system out frequently.

The residential installations have seen a number of innovative installation methods on some of the more constrained properties within the program area. We are currently scheduled to commence round 3 upgrade works at another 25-30 residential properties in September as well as a new wastewater treatment system at the Blackwood Caravan Park prior to the busy peak season commencing.

The Planning Assistance Program has seen approximately 25 vacant parcels of land involved at different stages in the program & our town planning & domestic wastewater consultants have been very busy finding innovative results for landholders. If you own a vacant parcel of land & would like to know more about the program, time is running out as we need to get works moving prior to the end of the year.

If you haven't spoken to me regarding the septic tank system at your property, please don't hesitate in contacting me to discuss. I am more than happy to meet on-site to discuss any questions you may have.

CFA REFORM - NOT REALLY

I joined the Blackwood Fire Brigade in 1964 after a big fire that impacted on the town earlier that year & have witnessed many positive changes to brigades & CFA over the years.

We are now faced with a proposal to re-structure fire services in Victoria. There are those who will tell us that this is good thing for Victoria & that the CFA will be granted independence to grow as a volunteer service & nothing will change in rural areas served by CFA.

Nothing could be further from the truth. I am particularly concerned of the impact of these changes for communities like Blackwood. Consider the following:

• Firstly the Legislation introducing these changes uses the term "Reform". What has been placed before us is not Reform, it is a crude & rushed re-structure.

This re-structure is not based on any strategic long-term objective other than to meet the short-term Industrial & Political whims of a Government.

Contrary to government claims, none of the recent government inquiries have recommended the model now being put forward.

The proposal lacks substance, credibility & direction, as no meaningful consultation has occurred with those with experience in fire operations, not even with key personnel in CFA & the Emergency Management Victoria.

• Previous objections to the Governments industrial agenda were based on real concerns that volunteers will be discriminated & sidelined in any EBA. Barriers placed in the Fair Work Act to stop interference to CFA volunteers have now been cleverly sidelined, as the new FRV will have total control over CFA through a management by secondment arrangement.

This has been created by a proposed structure relying on key management staff being seconded from the new separate Fire Rescue Victoria (FRV), with resultant loss of ownership, continuity, commitment & control within CFA.

Further, & just as concerning, the legislation severely curtails the independence & power of the CFA Chief Officer & Board to govern their organisation.

This loss of independence by CFA revealed in the legislation is already creating great anxiety within volunteer ranks & will see a lowering of morale & departure of volunteers from the service, particularly in integrated brigades.

Of particular concern is the destruction of the highly-successful integrated brigade model in Outer Metropolitan & Regional centres. These have traditionally been a major source of surge capacity to form Strike Teams when major fires break out in places like Blackwood.

• Consider also that the seconded staff will come from a largely metropolitan-based, new urban fire authority with minimal practical experience in supressing wildfire.

Brigades & Groups will be particularly effected under conditions, based on previous draft EBA's, soon to be rolled out, that propose to create new postings for FRV staff in CFA positions traditionally filled by CFA rmployees, many currently by lateral entry from volunteers. These include Community Safety & Education Officers & Brigade Administrative Support Officers. The previous EBA also proposed to place urban-based FRV Commanders,

with no local knowledge & only with a limited experience in bushfire operations & managing local groups of Brigades.

Under this legislation, CFA will be powerless to control these external interference in its management.

• Finally, the success of any major change such as this will be dependent upon adequate ongoing funding.

Remarkably, there has been no funding modelling for this re-structure.

The lack of autonomy for CFA under this re-structure does not augur well for any equitable cost-sharing arrangement between the 2 new services, particularly when the legislation clearly places CFA so dependant on FRV.

We simply don't know how the new Fire Services Levy will be apportioned or what mechanism will be put in place if CFA is financially compromised by these un-costed changes.

Consider the impact on Brigade donations if residents are hit hard with increase in the Fire Service Levy through their rates.

The flow-on effects to Brigades from the inevitable cost over-runs could potentially be disastrous for infrastructure improvements, equipment replacement, training programs & support.

A bottom-up approach through persistent, active leadership & advocacy by local brigades, in conjunction with staff committed to a fully-integrated organisation has been successful in making CFA the leading fire service in Australia.

The forces behind this current attempt at change will soon evaporate as do all political power struggles. This is a totally untried change with no precedence but will have serious consequences.

We will then be left will be an unworkable fire services management structure which has been born for the wrong reasons & will fail to deliver improved safety for Victorians.

Dear Editor.

Re - My last article & the history of the Oak tree next to the Blackwood Hotel. My son, Philip Hitchcock has an interest in trees & said that the name of

the Oak tree is both names ie - "ALGERIAN OAK TREE". With the botanical name Quercus canariensis. The Algerian oak is one of 450 species of deciduous & evergreen trees native to the temperate zone of Europe, Asia & North America with a small number extending into tropical Asia & America.

The oak is a large evergreen tree from the Mediterranean region occurring in the woodlands of Portugal, Spain, Tunisia, Algeria & Morocco & is a long-lived species.

The outstanding feature is the spring growth of bright lime green leaves that contrast with the dark colour of the trunk & branches. The leaves are very similar to the English oak (Quercus robur) in shape, turning dark green by late spring & evergreen in warm zones. In cooler zones the oak is semideciduous & completely deciduous in the coldest, turning a brown autumn colour before falling off.

The tree's stout trunk supports a canopy of broad spreading horizontal branches of dark grey, deeply fissured bark in a pattern of square rough plates. The acorns are a dark nut brown & ripen in April.

There is a grand old Algerian oak tree that was planted on 19 May 1863. It resides within the Kyneton Botanical Gardens in the town of Kyneton. This tree is listed by the National Trust on the Register of Significant Trees in Victoria. There are also 2 good specimens located in the Ballarat Botanical Gardens, one of which is believed to have been planted in 1920.

NATURAL RHYTHM Move with the Rhythm 1: **Exercise is Hard Work**

by Kathie Strmota

Lifestyles of convenience have reduced natural physical activity to such a degree that we have to schedule artificial 'exercise

routines' just to keep the blood flowing. This is such an unnatural concept that, for many people, maintaining such routines is a constant struggle. Regular physical activity is crucial for health, but it doesn't have to be a meaningless muscle-grind.

Some people joyfully maintain an exercise routine because they experience immediate pleasure & reward. Others are driven by focused purpose (athletes) or a whole-hearted goal (the bride-to-be with a too-tight wedding dress), where deeper motivation overpowers resistance. For the rest of us, routine exercise is a job we 'should do' but don't really care for, & that's a recipe for failure.

Unless an activity is pleasurable, & happens easily for you, give it up now, because life's too short. Move your body with activities you enjoy. Go dancing, chase the kids around the yard, join a local sports team, go rockclimbing, or get on your Wii.

Exercise should be a natural by-product of life, rather than one more thing you have to do. Back in the day, when we hunted & gathered, the idea of going to the cave-gym to lift stone-weights for an hour would have been

If your job is physically active, consider it a blessing. If not, incorporate more body movement into your usual activities (which already have purpose) for an extra thrill of physical exertion. Hand-wash the car (upperbody workout); hang washing from the ground (bend-stretch); stand for tasks that don't require sitting; walk or ride (don't drive); use stairs not lifts; & get physical with your friends by replacing a café sit-down with a walk on the beach. Such small changes can add up, effortlessly providing the fitness benefits of an 'exercise routine', often with greater emotionalmental benefits. I love stacking firewood when a load is delivered. There's pain & pleasure, & the gorgeous tiredness of a body well-stimulated, & then the best sleep I've had that week. There's also the wonderful sense of achievement, the empowerment of overcoming a challenge, & the fresh burst of pleasure each time I see my tidy wood-stack. I never experienced this complexity of satisfaction when running on a treadmill. I just got bored.



Operating this way also encourages unexpected exercise, simply because you're up-and-about. If you regularly walk (not drive) to local haunts, you'll inevitably end up in a power-walk or jog occasionally, like when I literally sprinted up the Golden Point Road hill until my lungs were on fire because I was late for a meeting. If a trainer had set me that task, I would have suddenly remembered a prior appointment with my couch. Yet, driven by purpose, I accidentally did an intensive work-out!

Such 'natural exercise' combines a wide variety of activities to give you a whole-body work-out, & also exercises your brain-muscles with stimulation & challenge, things repetitive exercise often fails to do. To recreate these benefits with exercise routines, you need to combine aerobic, resistance, fancy-foot-work, hand-eye, balance-work, stretching (all body parts), meditative exercise (walking, tai chi), & more ... & vary it regularly. Incidental body movement within daily activities is the epitome of 'living in your flow' regarding exercise, but you can successfully incorporate a pleasurable exercise routine by understanding your reasons, connecting with purpose, & doing suitable exercises at the optimum time of day (according to your body's natural daily rhythms & the structure of your own personal life).

In the next few issues, I'll explore different types of exercise, their benefits & optimum timing, & do some myth-busting around exercising for




Our visit to the Kyneton Botanic Gardens was definitely worth the visit. The many old trees some with the last of their leaves & a few extraordinary conifers.

WOOF: In this month's edition I would like to confess my deep dark secret, & NO it's not running away from home only to be found at the Blackwood pub after a quick jaunt across the cemetery chasing kangaroos. It's THUNDERSTORMS!!! I hate them & they scare the bejesus out of me.

For many of our 4 legged companions, thunderstorms can be very traumatic often presenting a range of behaviours that we would not ordinarily see in pets including;

hiding under furniture, drooling, pacing, barking & sometimes destructive chewing & even attempts to escape from the backyard or home. These can all be symptoms & behaviours of a storm-phobic pet so it's important that when dealing with a pet that suffers from storm or noise phobia to stay calm & be patient.

We do know that storm & noise phobia in pets is one of the most common behavioural problems however the reason some dogs fear storms & loud noises so much is not entirely known. The one thing we are sure of is that this can result in a very stressful situation for both the pet & the owners.

There are many safety measures that you can take to keep your pet safe & relaxed during thunderstorms. Talking to your local Vet would be the first step to helping your dog overcome their noise phobia. There are many

options available to assist in desensitising your dog to storms & depending on the severity of the phobia it may be as simple as providing some of the

- Provide your pet with a safe & familiar place. A small space like a toilet or bathroom can make your pet feel secure.
- It is important to anticipate your pet's reaction without letting them know, the best thing to do is keep routine & act as though nothing is happening, try not to mollycoddle them.
- Playing soothing music before your dog becomes frightened can help to maintain his composure, or at least be less stressed when the storm
- Thunderstorm & Fireworks CD's are available that can be played around the house to expose your dog to the common storm noises which in turn will begin the process of desensitisation.
- ThunderShirt's are a fantastic pressure jacket that applies constant pressure to relieve stress & has an amazing calming effect . This has proved a very effective drug-free solution.

All of these techniques should be used in conjunction with training & positive reinforcement.

Depending on the severity of your dog's phobia there are some natural anti-anxiety products that rely on the calming pheromones a mother dog produces around her pups which can be very effective.

If your dog suffers from storm or noise phobia contact your local Vet to discuss the best method that will assist in modifying your dog's behaviour during storms & loud noises.

So next time a thunderstorm rolls into Blackwood, I will be wearing my Thundershirt, chilling in my beanbag, curtains pulled & watching my favourite episode of Bondi Vet.!!

The History of Blackwood - Blackwood Religious book with bullet hole on display in Anglican Archives, Melbourne

The biggest tragedy that ever happened in Blackwood took place on 19th June 1908. Billy Pincombe in a fit of mental illness shot & killed the Anglican Minister, Mr. Harold Robinson

through the heart, while he was reading a religious book in front of his chest. The Religious book is now on display in the Anglican Archives. This book has a story in itself to tell. But, leading up to the book, is how the bullet hole got there in the first place.

I recently published "The Billy Pincombe Tragedy". The story tells of the events leading to an incident involving a man, his wife, the local preacher, the bible, some guns, an axe, a deranged woman & some of the people of Blackwood.

William (Billy) Torrington Pincombe was a Gold Miner in Blackwood in 1908. The bullet which shot Robinson went through the religious book he was reading as he walked on his verandah of the Vicarage next to All Saints Church in Blackwood. Billy Pincombe fired the shot from his house opposite the Vicarage, through a partly open window, while lying on a bed, & resting his rifle on the window sill & taking careful aim.

Billy & his new wife Annie Morrish lived in Blackwood after their marriage in January 1906 &, 10 months later, a son was born in Blackwood. A month after their son John was born, Annie was admitted to the Kyneton Hospital on November 20, 1906 suffering from mental illness & insanity brought on by confinement. Annie was admitted to the Sunbury Mental Hospital in 1906 age 21yrs. Annie's insanity was recorded as being in the form of religious mania whereby she had got out of bed & nearly chopped her right hand off with an axe. The question was asked - Did Pincombe imagine the book the minister was holding to be a bible & had fired at the instrument of his wife's self-maiming rather that at the man behind the book? To further explain this - The Leader newspaper report on June 21, 1908 stated: While at home, her madness, which took the form of religious mania, became more acute. During a raving fit, she kept repeating the biblical injunction, "If thy right hand offends thee, cut it off - my right hand hath offended me." She was found in the yard later with an axe in her left hand & her right hand severed at the wrist. She is now in the asylum hopelessly insane.

After Billy Pincombe shot the Minister, the local policeman shot Billy Pincombe through the head after which he died in the local Blackwood jail. So what became of the Religious book with the bullet hole in it? The religious book, was amazingly said to have been found at a church fete, returned to Blackwood & given to Tom Garnett who lent it to Bert Oliver, a trustee of the church, for safe custody. It used to be on display in a glass show-case in the Blackwood General Store, but was later removed when the store was sold in 2001. The book in the glass show-case was then in the safe keeping of All Saints Church of England in Blackwood. Recently All Saints Church closed down & members of the Blackwood Historical Society were concerned about the safe-keeping of the Religious book. Stuart Duff a concerned member of the Blackwood Historical Society rung the Anglican Archives in Melbourne & reported to them the whereabouts of this important historical book & that the society was concerned for

its safety. They got permission from the Anglican Diocese to come to Blackwood & removed the book in its glass showcase to the Anglican Archives in Melbourne. I have rung the Archives & told them about my book - "The Billy Pincombe Tragedy" & offered them a copy so they know the significance & history of the old religious book with the bullet hole in it. They told me they have the glass showcase on display with the book in it & also a glass showcase they removed said to be made by Peter De Groote with a diorama of a gold mining in Blackwood with a well-made turning wheel, which looks like a water wheel. Also they retrieved the hymn board dedicated to the minister. Rev Harold Robinson who was shot, to put together on display in their Archives. Helen, the Archivist of the Anglican Archives asked me if I could help her, she said "I am trying to locate information about the diorama that was donated to the Archives from the All Saints Anglican Church in Blackwood when it was closed. Hazel was told that this diorama was created by a Peter de Groot, a resident of Blackwood & member of the Church. I have found a small amount of information about him through the Blackwood Times but was wondering if you had any further details about when & why he created the diorama. I will send you some photos of it - it is a small goldfields scene with a turning wheel with pages noting the main landmarks in Blackwood."



REMEMBERING DAYLESFORD TRAGEDY AFTER 150 YEARS

June 30 marked the 150th anniversary of a tragic event in Daylesford's history where three children, aged 4, 5 & 6, became lost in local bushland & were never found alive.

Department of Environment, Land, Water & Planning Regional Manager Forest & Fire Operations Peter Kambouris said: "After a massive community search effort the remains of the children were found in September 1867, about eight to ten miles away from where they wandered off."

"In 1988 DELWP established the Three Lost Children Walk as part of the Bicentennial events", Mr Kambouris said.

"Little was known about the exact route that the boys took, but the walk uses existing roads to link the few known points of the boys' travels. The walk will take you through bush landscapes that were once active goldfields, & now part of the Wombat State Forest & the Hepburn Regional Park.

"Along the walk you will see the remnants of goldmines, water races & tramways.

"In 2007 DELWP in partnership with Hepburn Shire Council & Parks Victoria revamped the walk with new signs & a map to indicate the directions from Daylesford to Wombat Creek Dam & monument.

"Following the Three Lost Children Walk will help keep the memories of those little boys alive".


