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## JINNY AND BRENDAN HAVE ISSUES...84 OF THEM! PART II

In the last interview –Part I – you said that many important issues were covered over long periods of time in many issues. "The Blackwood Times became more than an historical document. It was a campaign paper as well". What are some of the memorable campaigns you have

Jinny - Most of our community would have been impacted by the septic program -Blackwood Localised Sewerage Project (BLSP). Our advocacy attracted a focus group of the major stakeholders associated with building in Blackwood including the Water Boards, EPA, state government. Out of that group came a grant from the State Government to upgrade septic systems so people could renovate and build.

Brendan - We found ourselves in a situation in a catchment area where the Water Boards decided that there would be no more septic systems created in Blackwood. As a result, for 15 years no one was allowed to build, renovate or upgrade businesses or extend existing buildings as the Council would not approve the installation of any new septic systems. Basically we were being strangled as a town. Blackwood Times took up the campaign. It took a few years but we succeeded and were able to build and renovate, albeit in a restricted

Jinny - Initially we called a public meeting & out of that came a group called Blackwood Action Group (BAG) who researched & advocated. Blackwood Times had regular articles noting BAG's progress. It was this advocacy that attracted funding through a grant from the State Government. (https://theblackwoodtimes.com.au/ february-march-2016-issue/)

Brendan – The back story to the campaign was that way back when John Brumby was the Premier and Thwaites was the Water Minister, about \$40mill was set aside to sewer the small towns up in this area including places like Gordon, Skipton and Blackwood. That project went ahead but one little town fell off the end of the project and that was Blackwood! We waited quite a few years for the solution and when the solution fell over we had to take up the cause again. That's when we realised we had to run the campaign for septic upgrades ourselves and the Blackwood Times was the voice for the town. We kicked the campaign off with a photo of an old dunny on the front page (https://theblackwoodtimes.com.au/october-november-2012/) and our own investigative journalism. The whole town was invited to a public meeting hosted by The Times.

Jinny - This all occurred during a State Election where we had lost our previous member so it was open house to whoever would be elected in. We had all the political candidates campaigning. Mary-Anne Thomas made a promise that if she got in she would have a focus group within 100 days. She got in and she made good on her promise and we had the Minister visit Blackwood on a number of occasions bringing all the agencies to the table for discussion. This was three Water Boards and the Victorian Environment Protection Authority. Previously these groups did not speak to us. It was a four year campaign.

Brendan – As a result of the go-ahead Blackwood became a test case for the first new technology septic systems in Vic in 25yrs. Previously Victoria was a laggard in this area as all around the country these systems were being adopted. The EPA's attitude in Victoria was to use no new technology. This was our most successful campaign which had good positive outcomes for the community.

Jinny - Another campaign the Times was involved with was the installation of the mobile tower in Blackwood. We had considerable expansion at the time with new people coming into town and many people relied on mobiles for internet coverage.

How has the Blackwood Times changed over the years-in focus, content and style

Jinny - In the last few years we have placed a heavy emphasis on photos. We have learnt a lot and this is shown in the paper. We have become more confident in dealing with content.

Brendan – Jinny has honed her project management skills over the years as I have with my writing. It's been a great education for me.

Jinny - We have also become more confident with advocacy. The previous Blackwood Newsletter had a 'no politics'. I followed this approach through until I realised we were losing a great chance to respond to the needs of the town. We were losing the opportunity

to bring about positive change. This is particularly important as we don't have a lot of services. The local commercial papers don't do many stories about Blackwood unless it is a big story. We have no direct mail delivery. It was important to broaden our

What is different about the Blackwood Times compared to

other local papers Jinny-We are not a commercial paper, we get no funding & rely on advertising & donations. We are completely volunteer run. We are very specific in what we print, it should be relevant to Blackwoodians, even with articles like the gig guide. The purpose and mission of the Blackwood Times is to serve, communicate & advocate.

Brendan –In it's 15 years of publication The Times has also promoted issues of importance to local community groups and clubs. For instance, CERT, CFA and the Community Emergency Management Plan. We championed their causes and ran with them.

Jinny - We have also helped groups with their fundraising efforts by promoting them in free advertisements as well as articles & photo spreads. Not through lack of trying, one unsuccessful campaign was when DWELP took away our community vote for our Crown Reserves

Brendan - We argued with DELWP (Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning) over their decision to appoint our committee members to the Crown Reserves Committee of Management. Previously every 3 years the community would elect the representatives. One year we elected a largely fresh committee of 9 nominees and DELWP countermanded that election. It was a difficult situation as they took away the community's right to elect their representatives. It was a long BL and arduous campaign that was never resolved to serve the community.

It's not about running a boutique, high-end paper. For

instance, with our small distribution, there is little chance that we could afford to go full colour. As a designer, the style is deliberately a bit folksy and country. Despite proofing pre-press there are often mistakes we haven't had time to pick-up. I never mind if people point out mistakes - at least they are reading it ... Many new people to town have told us that they have read the Times and how Blackwood sounded like a fantastic community. In fact I know of a number of people who have moved here because of how great our wee village

Brendan - A quote comes to mind from the time we won the Community Newspapers Association of Victoria (CNAV) 'Best Community Content' award way back when we were still the Blackwood News. A part of the judges comment was "Although the Blackwood News is a black and white publication, there is still plenty of colour in its pages." This resonated with us as we have always tried to ensure the Blackwood Times is full of colourful stories, reflecting the community we live in. (https://theblackwoodtimes.com. au/april-may-2011/)

#### A POST OFFICE RENO



Running a post office was not the plan when Carol and Martyn moved from inner suburban Melbourne to Greendale over 12 years ago. Martyn had always been handy with tools and ran a home maintenance business while Carol worked in education. Carol had long had an interest in selling antiques which is where the post office story begins.

Carol and a friend had a stall at the Brick Lane market in Daylesford and enjoyed it as a "working hobby". When this came to an end she wanted to find somewhere else to continue her hobby. At the time the Blackwood Post Office was being run as a post office and also sold antiques and bric a brac. Carol approached the then owner about having vintage bits and pieces in the shop on consignment. It wasn't long before the owner casually mentioned that the business was for sale and the rest, as they say, is history.

It was 5 years ago last April that Carol and Martyn made the leap



and bought the post office. At first it was the business only but they then also purchased the premises, always with the view of extending at some stage. It has taken 3 or 4 years, much hard work, loads of frustration and sometimes tears to get the required permits, but work is finally underway.

The building itself is over 100 years old and has been home to many different enterprises. In the early 1900s it was a hay and corn store. For a long time it was a part of The Blackwood General Store. You could actually walk straight through from the Blackwood General Store into the existing post office building. At one stage the Blackwood Historical Society was given the building to operate as a museum. However an alternative site for the museum was found and the building was sold to

help finance the project.

During the 1970s the building was earmarked for demolition ,which is not surprising as the building has been propped up on bricks and rotting stumps. Because of this, the first stage of the renovation is all about protecting the existing building which really had to be rebuilt from the ground up. The old flooring was removed, concrete stumps put in, all joists replaced, a new floor installed and existing walls straightened. The building now is as solid as a rock. It will easily survive the next 200 years.


The next stage will see the building extended mainly on the driveway side and down towards the carport which will allow for a new kitchen, post office space and toilet. After that the outside area under the Birch trees will be decked. The outcome will be a flexible space that will combine food, café seating, retail and post office services.

The post office is very much at the heart of the Blackwood community and the work currently being carried out will enable it to continue to

be a great benefit to both locals and visitors to our town.

The project itself is a fantastic example of our community working together with much of the building being done by Martyn and fellow local builder Steve Empey. Carol said that they had been incredibly lucky to have Steve on the project and described him as both a "wonderful tradesman and a wonderful person" as well as "a delight to work with."

So many others have assisted with the project to date with architect Rick Blake deserving a shout out for sticking through numerous delays and changes. Monique Rasing, who was the projects drafts person, also did a great job



office allowing for the work to commence.

In such a small town you would think it would have proven very difficult to find a space to allow the post office to continue functioning for the community while the building works are underway. Such is the nature of our community however that Martyn and Carol received offers from the two nearest businesses. The pub kindly offered to provide some space and the same offer from Simon and Simon allowed them to continue operating right next door. The Simon's and Suzie have been very generous and hospitable with their time and space, but it won't be too long now before the post office can start operating back in their building albeit not finished.

There are still many unknowns and like before, the business will no doubt evolve as it goes along. What will be offered while the renovation is underway will depend on spaces available as the project continues. On completion what will be offered is yet to be worked out but will be determined by the culinary skills that new and existing staff will bring. What is known, however, is that Carol and Martyn will continue to go above and beyond to provide an amazing service for our community.

'The Fairvale Ladies Book Club' by Sophie Green

A woman called Sybil who was well-known and influential around the town, managed to bring together family members and others around the town involved in the Women's Country Club, to form a Book club. **Jane:** Definitely, a women's book. A diverse group of women each with their own challenges living in the Northern Territory who come together not only to share books. I really enjoyed the book, a well-constructed easy read with believable characters bonding through their love of reading.

Empty Cradles by 'Margaret Humphries'

**Sandy:** Empty Cradles is Margaret Humphries' journey in uncovering the child migration program which wrenched children from the homes and familiar surroundings to unfamiliar and hostile territory. The children were shipped to Canada, Australia and Africa. Often used for hard labour and abusive institution life. Margaret was able to reconnect some people with lost parents and siblings. Their stories were a stark parallel with our own Indigenous children, also wrenched from the families and communities to cruel institutional lives.

Sad and confronting stories which may not be a good read for some who may have suffered trauma. A must for some truth telling of Australia's dark history.

Yet another terribly sad tale of decisions made by authorities, in this case the church, with deeply disturbing consequences. The authorities have a lot to answer for when it comes to our children they

## SOME EARLY HISTORY OF "LITTLE DOATY" DIED BLACKWOOD 23 OCTOBER 1878.



This month of October commemorates the 144th vear since the Historical death of a much loved little girl who died at Blackwood and lies in a grave just inside the man gate of the Blackwood cemetery with the inscription of 'Little Doaty died 23 October

Many visitors to the Blackwood Cemetery stop at the little grave inside the main gate and wonder who was "Little Doaty". The family story was told to the Blackwood Historical Society by Mrs Mary Kane who is the daughter of Doaty's brother John Rowan. It tells how Doaty was the eldest child of Joseph Rowan Clerk of Courts of Blackwood. Her mother, Margaret Keiran was born in Melbourne in 1855, and her father, Joseph Rowan was born in 1844 Tipperary, Ireland, they were married on the 10th September 1873 at Sandhurst (Bendigo).

Doaty had one brother John Keiran Rowan who was born in Sandhurst on 2 January 1876. Doaty was born in August 1874 at Sandhurst, (Bendigo) and was named after both parents Josephine Margaret. A family photo of Doaty, taken in Sandhurst (Bendigo), when she was aged 2 yrs and dated 20 October 1876 shows a pretty little girl with dark hair and pale eyes in a pretty lacy dress. The photo was kindly lent to the author by the niece of Doaty, Mrs. Kane This photo was taken in Sandhurst (Bendigo), just 2 years before Doaty died tragically at the age of 4 years from an epidemic of diphtheria raging in the district. Mrs Kane made several trips to Blackwood to attend the Blackwood Historical Society's meetings and she arrived by taxi from Kew in Melbourne. The author then visited Mrs Kane in her home where she was lent the family photos of Doaty and her parents so they could be copied by Margot for the Historical Society's records.

Margot Hitchcock paid for and obtained Doaty's death certificate, it states her name as Josephine Margaret Rowan aged 4 yrs, who died

A report in the Bacchus Marsh Express paper states "Mr Rowan, Clerk of Petty Sessions, has, I regret to say, lost his oldest child, a fine little girl who died on Wednesday night at 10 o'clock from Diphtheria".

Her parents were heartbroken and her mother's health suffered. On medical advice, Doaty's mother went to stay with her relatives in New Zealand. (Mrs. Rowan's father was a doctor in New Zealand.) Joseph Rowan stayed in Blackwood in his role as Clerk of Courts,

to look after their son John with the help of a nurse. Mrs Annie Byres was said to be like a second mother to young John. Very sadly John was never to see his mother again and remembered being preoccupied playing with a new toy car his mother gave him on the verandah when she left after a tearful goodbye. For unfortunately Mrs Rowan's health became worse and she had to delay her return home, and died suddenly on the 27 February 1883, age 27 yrs of pneumonia at Kumara near Hokitika on the South Island of New Zealand and was buried there. Her father, Thomas Keiran,



a surgeon, as listed as the medical attendant at her death and her mother's name was Kate Keiran nee Sweeney. Mrs Rowan had arrived in New Zealand in 1879 and had been there 4 years at her death and her son John, was noted on her death certificate as being 7 years of age. (Digger records show Thomas Keiran and Catherine Sweeney had 4 children with two boys who died young and Margaret and Mary Jane Keiran surviving. Margaret Keiran born 1855, married Joseph

However true is this story from official records and her family, another Blackwood version of how Doaty died was told to the Blackwood Historical Society by the late Bill Matheson by his grandmother. It recalls how Doaty was left in the charge of some neighbours for the day while her parents were away. Sometime towards evening she and another girl, (said by the late Frank Matheson to be Sue Vigor quite a lot older than herself went for a walk). On the way they chased a mob of goats which were plentiful about Blackwood at the time. She became separated from the other girl and was later found drowned.

After checking the Bacchus Marsh Express papers on the death of Doaty there also appeared a report some six weeks previously which reported the death of a child, Selina Bass 21 months old who drowned in a waterhole on the 13th September 1878 at her grandmother's (Margaret Lindsay) home, her mother's name being Jane Bass. Maybe this last bit of evidence goes to show how the confusion about drowning and diphtheria could have arisen with the two little girls deaths being within a short time of each other. Evidence to show how folklore can be passed through the generations and the true story forgotten or mixed up with time.

It is thought that "Doaty" must have been her baby way of saying "Josie" which is probably the name her parents called her. The Rowan's home was on the high bank of Golden Point Road that leads to the Mineral Springs. When the fortunes of the town declined the old home with many others was removed to Trentham. Doaty's father, Joseph Rowan went to live at Beechworth around 1886 where he remarried and became the Police Magistrate and Warden of the North Eastern Goldfields.

The Beechworth Historical Society's Museum has a photo of Joseph Rowan listed with their early pioneers, as seen by the author.

#### CARING FOR OUR PATCH



Local artist Kathy Holowko and photographer Daniel Williams, have produced a remarkable three minute animated film for Blackwood and Barry's Reef Landcare Group, which is both educational and visually beautiful. Through the vision of past Landcare President Shane Scanlan along with Diana Dawson, an application for a grant from Melbourne Water was successful. The film aims to help educate Blackwood residents on the importance of weed control to promote healthy waterways. Kathy's proposal was chosen for her artistry and her knowledge of and empathy for the Blackwood landscape.

Kathy –" I was really interested in applying to do this project because all of my artwork is based around telling stories of ecology and I'm always searching for ways that can help communicate this through

art. We put forward the idea of an animated short story for Landcare. We took a chance to say ... you know what, it might be a bit unusual to talk about environmental through issues drawing and



animation rather than using real images but I really thought that seeing Blackwood transformed into an illustrated wonderland would catch people's attention and keep them watching, so that the message was heard".

"The visual concept was to show Blackwood in a very colourful, artistic and illustrative way. I used quality paper, bleedproof fineliners and watercolours. Using a photo reference I would loosely draw in the black lines and add the colour in watery drops. Adding the colour is a really beautiful process because it's out of control! Then it was a matter of sitting down with the scalpel and cutting out each piece. The process took many hours, but the good thing was once they were created, some of the trees or the hills, or other pieces could be reused in another scene. Each element is a separate component that is layered in a 3 dimensional scene, so we could set up a scene and then



the camera could travel through the landscape. We also used stop motion and moved some objects frame by frame. There was a lot of frames for Daniel to stitch together - over 1000 individual photographs! All the artwork can be stored away in a shoebox sized container with the larger components layered flat in my plan draws. One day I hope to turn them into dioramas.

"The concept and script was really based on Shane's proposal, and we made sure that it ticked all the boxes for what Melbourne Water wanted us to accomplish which

was explaining how weeds spread through our waterways and what we can do about it. It was a matter of re-writing it in a way that was sequential and could actually be visualized."

"I hope people enjoy watching Blackwood illustrated in this this animation and think about the beautiful environment that we live in and how we can all tackle weeds to ensure our native species thrive."

#### A BLACKWOOD GARDEN

It's been a cold wet Winter and now Spring is slow to warm and it's continuing to be wet.

I'm no gardening expert, but I have become passionate about growing things and have worked out how to manage my Blackwood garden. I've made many mistakes but have learnt along the way and had lots of success as well. There are many of you who are new to Blackwood and possibly creating your first garden, so some of what I've learnt might



I know the most important thing to make a good garden is soil... good soil!. In my garden I've had to contend with heavy clay and shale and no topsoil. Had I known how important good soil is, I would have worked harder at creating it and added as much organic matter as I could lay my hands on and learnt how to make good compost. I'm getting better at making compost. I have found that cutting up the plant matter creates compost faster. There's lots of information available on making good compost to build up your soil. Use plenty of compost and aged well-rotted manure. Gypsum is invaluable as a clay breaker. Slow release fertilisers, sprinkled on the surface, will be watered in

Like all gardeners I have spent too much time weeding. While the soil is wet weeds are much easier to pull out so now is a great time to try to rid your garden of weeds. Every year there seems to be new weeds arriving. Unfortunately many come in with the plants you buy.

I don't like using poisons so adding mulch to garden beds also helps to keep weeds down.



Until last year, February only frostmonth in Blackwood but then we had a frost! The late frosts in Spring seem to be the worst because they hit the tender new growth. Because Blackwood has a cool climate and a short warm season. many seeds are best sown in early Spring in punnets and not planted out until the soil

warms. Some seeds however, such as beans and carrots, are best sown directly in the soil. I've never planted my tomato seedlings until Cup Day and have found that works well. Recently I learned to plant them deeply, about 
of their height which has helped to give them a sturdier

Look around to see what does well here, never be afraid to ask others for their tips and tricks and enjoy gardening!

## THE HISTORY OF MARGOT HITCHCOCK

... continued from August~September issue.

Question: What made you become interested and influenced you in becoming a Historian and Genealogist?

In my interest of Genealogy, I became a member of the 'Australian Institute of Genealogical Studies', and volunteered to help in their library where I learnt to research records, and was then offered a job as a Professional Researcher. With this knowledge, I then researched my own Family Tree and that of many other requests for help with family Genealogy. My research led me to the Public Records Office, Shipping records, Latrobe Library and later Trove- Australian early newspapers on-line, and Victorian BD& M records, and Inquest Records etc.

Question: As a founding member of the Blackwood & District Historical Society, could you tell us how you became a member?



I went to the first Meeting on the 14th April 1973, organized in the Blackwood Hall over Easter by Bill Matheson, who thought it was a good idea to form a Historical Society. I became a member and was voted onto the committee, and have been the Official Historian since 1980 because of my interest in writing and researching local history. This was followed by being asked by Alan Buckingham to become Co-Author of a book on the history of Blackwood. I typed up my contribution on my

portable typewriter for this book called 'Aspects of Early Blackwood'. and it was published in 1980, and launched in the Blackwood Hotel by the Minister of Tourism from Ballarat. Today, I am the only active person left who is still a current member of the Blackwood Historical Society for 49 years.

Question: How has the love of photography played a major part of your ability to visually capture history?

In my role as Historian for the Blackwood Historical Society, I visited people from Blackwood who had stories and photos to show me of early days in Blackwood. I bought a Pentax [SLR] Single Lens Reflex camera with a Macro lens for copying photos, and set up a stand for copying photos lent to me. I was also lent some old glass negatives which I paid to have made into photos. People also contacted me through my web page which I set up in 2000 with some help, where people emailed me copies of their family photos. With these, now over 1,000 copies of photos, I feel they bring to life the true history of Blackwood.

Question: How and when did the Blackwood Historical Society move into the old Police Stables?

The Blackwood Historical Society was given permission to use and restore the old Police Stables building as a Historical Museum, by the Education Department, who then occupied the Police Station for Special Needs Children as a school camp. The money for some renovations came from the sale of the building next to the General store, that had been donated to the Historical Society by the family of the late Cyril Jones, but due to problems with boundary areas, and an underground petrol tank, this building was sold to the Store, and the money agreed

upon by the Society to be used to build a museum at the back of the Police Stables. This work on the Stables was commenced in1976, and carried out by members of the Society together with members of the Police Historical Re-Enactment Society, who joined the Historical Society.



Working bees were held, led by Stuart Duff, and work was completed to lock-up stage in 1978, with work also done on the interior of the Stables, where various donations of historical items were put on display. The Stables were open over the Easter celebrations in Blackwood in 1978, and members took part in the Parade. At the Easter Events in 1979, members of the Society and Police Re-Enactment Society put on a shoot-out between 'bushrangers', and the Society members dressed in period costumes and Police Uniforms, with the Stables open to the public showing a Police Historical and Goldfield's display in the Stables.

In 1984, I became the Editor of the Blackwood's Historical Society's magazine called 'The Blackwood Recorder', and I used my portable typewriter and typed up the magazine which we had copied to give

In 1998, Alan Hall, a builder and President of the Society, then commenced to build a Meeting Room and Museum on the back of the Stables, to incorporate a kitchen and a big area to display historical items and photographs etc. This work was completed in 2003, during which time the Historical Society had been dormant for several years. The Historical Society resumed in 2004 with some original and new members interested in continuing the work on the Police Stables restoration, so that it could be an added tourist attraction to Blackwood, and show some of Blackwood's fascinating Gold Mining Era.

Question: You have written nearly 60 research papers and 4 books on Blackwood's History. Could you tell us about some of them?

In 2006, I was given a Victorian Small Grant, organized by a member of the Society, Pat Liffman, and in 2007, I typed up a new book called 'Some History of Simmons Reef, Blackwood' on my new computer. It was printed in July 2007, and launched by Don Nardella M.P. Member

In 2009, following my debilitating stroke, I commenced to write my next book 'The Billy Pincombe Tragedy- The Tragic shootings of a Minister and Billy Pincombe', which I typed up on my computer. It was printed in 2014, and launched in the Blackwood Historical Museum by Stuart Duff.

Over the years since, I have kept up my love of the history of Blackwood, and continue to add information to my Blackwood web page - www.blackwoodpublishing.com and also add information to my Facebook page- 'Blackwood History and Pioneers', and answer enquiries about family ancestors and the history of Blackwood.

My next book - 'History and Pioneers of Blackwood' was commenced in 1996 when I purchased my first computer. Over the 30 years I have researched this book, I have typed up over 700 pages. It is hoped that one day I can obtain a Government or similar grants to have it published, so I can share these pages of interesting history

Thanks to all the people, who over the forty nine years I have been collecting photos and information on the history of Blackwood, have helped me to show that "I have a legacy to leave the present and future generations of people who love Blackwood".

# WALKING TRACKS DAMAGE UPDATE PLUS A FEW WALKS

Lerderderg Heritage River Walk has been largely cleared and should

Other cleared tracks include New Sultan Mine, Pottery, Povey, Morning Star and Byers Back Track Walking Trail.

Whipstick Loop Walk remains closed due to the storm damage experienced last year. DELWP Storm Recovery Team has advised that: "... due to the extent of infrastructure damage to the Whipstick Loop track it is unlikely that this track will re-open this year."

Many thanks to DELWP and to all those involved in clearing our local tracks. This has been a mammoth task. It's great to be able to walk our forests again.

For those wanting to walk closer to town, here are a few options. Note distances are approximate.

Whalebone Rd - Martin St - Blackwood Cemetery

The old log mining huts in Whalebone Road date from the early 20th century. The white hut belonged to the Shaws who built Shaws Lake and many surrounding water races (see walk below). In 1944 the Shaw family gifted an area of 1.5 acres comprising Shaws Lake and its immediate surroundings to the town, as a reserve for public purposes.

Many of the buildings situated along Martin Street are original, dating from the late 19th or early 20th century. The cemetery in Byres Road was established in 1860, although it is believed there were burials at the site prior to this. The cemetery has many old pioneer graves and a Chinese burial site at the rear.

Whalebone Rd - Shaws no. 7 water race track - Mineral Springs Reserve - Shaws Lake: total distance: 2.19 kms

40 metres down Whalebone Road take the water race track on the right which leads to the playground at Mineral Springs Reserve, follow GDT (Great Dividing Trail) signposts.

This track is incorporated into the Great Dividing Trail network and

signposted accordingly. The water race is narrow with steep drop offs, some erosion and great views down to the river. 500 metres along the water race there is a short diversion from the original track due to erosion. Stay right and follow signs.

Segment distances:

BLACKWOOD

Top of Whalebone Road to Mineral Springs footbridge: 1.29 kms

Footbridge to Shaws Lake Rotunda (turn left over footbridge): 0.9 kms

Shaws Lake Full Circuit Loop. Total distance: 6.2 kms

Cross Mineral Springs footbridge and turn left to Shaws Lake or take the water race track on right to North Blackwood Road. The water race section is narrow, somewhat eroded and can be slippery when wet.

If turning left (my preference), follow the track up to Shaws Lake, continue on the road past the lake to North Blackwood Road, turn right

and follow it down to Lerderderg river. Turn right on the near side of the river onto water race track and follow this back to the Mineral Springs footbridge.

Note that the GDT sign indicating water race track junction with North Blackwood Road located the road.



Shaws Lake Half Circuit via Moonlight Gully & Sweets Lookout (steep). Total distance: 2.5 kms

For a shorter, but steeper Shaws Lake circuit, cross the Mineral Springs footbridge and turn right along the old Cocciardis water race

Approx 600 metres along the water race turn left at the 'Lookout' sign (Moonlight Gully) and climb steeply uphill to the site of Sweet's Lookout. Follow the path and turn left at Shaws Lake Road to Shaws Lake. Follow the path past Shaws Lake back to the footbridge.

Unfortunately Sweet's Lookout is no longer in existence, although the location is still known by this name. It would be great to see it reinstated. What do you think? Segment distances:

Footbridge to Lookout sign: 0.6 kms Lookout sign up to Sweet's Lookout: 0.26 km steep

Whalebone Rd - Lerderderg River crossing - unnamed track to Shaws Lake circuit. Total distance: 1 km

This alternative route to Shaws Lake is limited to summer months due to river crossing.

Start on the corner of Martin Street and Whalebone Road. Walk down the

length of Whalebone Road, (passing the GDT water race track), until you reach the River. Do not turn sharp left to the river at the bottom of the hill, instead continue on the road as it veers right and curves a number of times down to the river. Cross the river and take the unnamed track almost immediately on the right. This track leads up to the Shaws Lake circuit track, then turn left to Shaws Lake or right to the Mineral Springs footbridge.

Segment distances:

Top of Whalebone to Lerderderg River crossing: 0.7 kms

Track opposite side of river up to Shaws Lake circuit: 300 metres Research your walk and take a map!

'Wombat Forest Touring Guide' map is available for sale at the Blackwood Post Office Coffee Shop and Store. The map shows Lerderderg Heritage River, Whipstick Loop and GDT walks, but without much detail. More detailed bushwalking maps (ie 1:25,000) are available through Vicmaps and there are several online apps.

'AllTrails' and Bushwalking Victoria websites have walk descriptions

Walking Groups. Many walking groups walk locally including Trentham Walking Group (Neighbourhood House), Daylesford U3A, The Great Dividing Trail Association and Melton Bushwalkers.

Watch out for snakes year round. Snakes are semi-dormant in winter, but still seek water and warmth. I met a very aggressive snake early July last year, luckily it stood up and said hello at a distance, allowing us both to back away nervously!

#### BLACKWOOD CFA

Now that spring is here it is time to replace the batteries in your smoke detectors and to check the date to ensure they are still current, for example, less than ten years old.

Working smoke detectors have proven time and time again to be life savers so don't let yours fail.

Earlier in September we attended a range hood fire in the Greendale area, which is a timely reminder regarding smoke detectors as well as fire fighting apparatus in the kitchen and house.

In the kitchen you should have a fire blanket mounted correctly in an easily accessible location near the stove and a small dry chemical fire extinguisher which should also be accessible. We often talk about event of a house fire?

Take some time to discuss a plan with your family, such as what to do when you notice a fire, the use of extinguishers, identifying several exit points around the house to safely escape a fire in any part of the building, the correct number to call such as 000 or dialling 112 on a mobile phone and a gathering place for everyone to meet. Also consider the correct information to give to the call taker including address, closest cross street, number of occupants, any injuries, any persons trapped and number of storeys to name a few. All of these help in getting appliances there quickly including ambulances and police if necessary. The better prepared you are, the better you can protect your family and yourself. Remember the most important rule is -

#### THE FIRST PRIORITY IS YOUR SAFETY

Always ring 000 in the case of any emergency. If you have and fire and do manage to put it out, it is better to have us responding than to wait until it is too late.

For more information contact the station on 53686526 on Sunday mornings over the summer period and the first Sunday of every month during the rest of the year, as we are there for training and equipment checks.

Never let complacency set in and always be prepared, no matter what the season.



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
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
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
